Making a Difference Awards

Marigold Library System's Making a Difference Award recognizes and celebrates excellence and innovation in library service. The Award traditionally acknowledges a library and team who are proud of an achievement in an area such as programming, outreach, advocacy and public relations, partnerships, innovative use of technology, inclusion, equity, and diversity, and intellectual freedom. Please note that the evaluation criteria for this year has changed.

A winner and an honourable mention will be chosen by the Marigold Library Board Standards and Services Committee from a library that serves a population of less than 2,000 people and a library that serves a population of more than 2,000 people. Each winner will receive a certificate of recognition and a monetary award of \$1000 and each honourable mention will receive a certificate of recognition and a monetary award of \$500 to be used at the local Library Board's discretion.

Indigenous Information

Decolonizing Pledge

Decolonizing begins with individuals and then moves out into our communities, our countries, and the world. Here is a short list of steps anyone can take to begin the process. Please feel free to use any part of this document to create a pledge for your own library staff and patrons.

I will...

- Discover whose traditional territory my home is on.
- Learn how to say a few words in the language of the local nation. Simple to use, free apps to help you learn Metis, Nakoda, Cree, and Blackfoot languages are available.
- Attend a cultural event such as a powwow or lecture.
- Learn about the residential school system and its long reaching impacts.
- Learn about the distinction between elected and hereditary leadership.
- Read about <u>Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action</u> and consider how they might apply in your life.

• Read the <u>UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples</u> (UNDRIP). Don't be intimidated, it is thirty two pages long but the font is very large!

- Read at least one fiction and one nonfiction book by an Indigenous writer.
 There is an amazing abundance of Indigenous titles being published right now. My favorite for nonfiction is "Indigenous Writes" by Chelsea Vowell. "Indian Horse" by Richard Wagamese would help you learn about the residential schools as well as being a wonderful read.
- Listen to an Indigenous podcast. I like "Warrior Life" by Pam Palmeter but there are hundreds to choose from with a wide range of subject matter.
- Look for and follow Indigenous social media influencers. I follow many
 Indigenous content creators; one I really enjoy is @yllwhrseblackfoot on TikTok. I
 think it is important to say that Indigenous creators on social media are constantly
 attacked which can be painful to witness.
- Educate myself about the many ways colonization is still impacting Indigenous people.
- Be willing to feel discomfort as I learn about Canada's history.

Introduction to Blackfoot

Blackfoot is a language spoken by the Blackfoot people who are indigenous to the Great Plains region of North America. It is a part of the Algonquian language family, which includes languages like Cree and Ojibwe.

Learning Blackfoot can provide a deeper understanding of the Blackfoot culture and traditions. It allows you to connect with the rich heritage of the Blackfoot people and gain insights into their worldview.

In the Rivers to Success language series, you will learn the fundamentals of the Blackfoot language, including essential phrases, vocabulary, and pronunciation. Their skilled language instructor will lead interactive sessions and provide resources for further practice.

Project Grant Funding for Rural Library Boards

For the second year in a row, the Ministries of Agriculture & Irrigation and Municipal Affairs are partnering to offer public library boards serving populations of 20,000 or less one-time project funding to build capacity and skills for work, learning, digital literacy, and support for new Canadians. The purpose of this one-time grant program is to support public library boards in rural areas to strengthen their service and/or program offerings to support their communities in becoming resilient and sustainable.



Public libraries have a role to play in empowering and educating teens and young adults to fight for their right to read freely. Join representatives from Brooklyn Public Library, Seattle Public Library, and Austin Public Library as they share strategies for helping teens to engage in intellectual freedom advocacy and make their voices heard.

 Verbalize the goals of the Books Unbanned campaign, and how they may be replicated in other libraries;

 Understand how libraries can proactively protect the needs and rights of youth regarding reading access;
